Jennifer was a member of the Wisconsin 4-H Senior Team at the 1991 National 4-H Dairy Judging Contest at World Dairy Expo placing 6th out of 37 states. She also judged in college, representing UW-Madison, on the 1997 National Championship Team at WDE, where Jennifer was 9th high individual and 6th high in reasons. Additionally, Jennifer was high individual at the 1995 Accelerated Genetics Dairy Judging Contest. Jennifer has degrees in Dairy Science and Agriculture Journalism. She served Wisconsin as the 51st Alice in Dairyland in 1998. She co-owns Badgerland Nutrition, Inc. where she is a dairy nutrition consultant. Jennifer and her husband Larry, along with their 3 kids Brianna, Austin, and Abby, own Jenlar Holsteins & Brown Swiss in Chilton, Wisconsin. Since 2015, Jenlar has garnered 24 Brown Swiss All American Nominations and one Junior All American Holstein, and have exhibited 11 class winners at Junior and Open Shows at World Dairy Expo, with 10 in Brown Swiss and one Junior Holstein. All but one animal has carried the Jenlar prefix. The Meyer family's most notable cow is Jenlar Carter Waltz ETV, the Intermediate Champion of the Brown Swiss Open Show and Grand Champion of the Junior Show at WDE in 2019. Jenlar's Holstein BAA is 108.8 and average Brown Swiss score is 88.3 points. Jennifer enjoys dairy judging and continues to help coach youth.
