If these numbers are not impressive enough, Crescentmead Farms also bred fifty Gold Metal Dams and 71 Dam of Merits while also breeding 200 bulls that walked the A.I. floors of many different bull studs. A herd that speaks itself, Niles and his brother, along with their children, exhibited forty-nine open and Jr. All-American heifers and cows. 
